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Patti Payne: Eva Schloss had 'courage and fortitude' on display at UW

A long line of people snaked around the University of Washington's Husky Union Building on Nov. 5, waiting patiently in the dark to get in to hear 93-year-old **Eva Schloss** tell her story. The Holocaust survivor and stepsister of **Anne Frank**, Schloss first sat quietly, signing her book "Eva's Story" at the VIP reception.

Pineapple Hospitality, led by President and CEO <u>Michelle Barnet</u>, presented the event along with Chabad at the University of Washington, a homey haven for thousands of Jewish students at UW.

Under heavy security in the face of concerns over increasing anti-Semitic crimes nationally and locally, Schloss then moved to the theater, where she was interviewed by UW President **Ana Mari Cauce** in front of hundreds of people. The soft-spoken survivor shared untold horrors in careful, measured detail, taking up where Frank's diary left off.

"Eva gave a piece of herself to tell her incredible story of courage and fortitude, and Seattle showed up to listen with compassion and a desire to learn from our collective past," Barnet said. "So proud to have been a part of this extraordinary evening."
